THE NEXT GENERATION OF SERVICE: A YOUNG VINCENTIAN'S REFLECTION

Dearest St. Vincent de Paul family:

Instead of my usual reflection, I thought it would be good to share with you excerpts of a heartfelt letter to the parish by a young man who helps with feeding the homeless one night a week, as it appeared in their Sunday bulletin. This is a great local example of our dear Saint Vincent de Paul ministry in action. How enriching to see the young involved encouraging us all to even greater efforts!

"Fr. Michael,

Hello, I am Josue, and I am doing a project centered around the work St. Vincent de Paul does for the homeless. My opinion is that more of the church community should volunteer with St. Vincent de Paul to help the homeless. That way, we can give care and aid to those who need it most.

The St. Vincent de Paul volunteer group is tasked with feeding and providing for the homeless. We do this every Thursday evening at around 6:30 where we meet up at the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament. We help provide for those who aren't as lucky as to have food or a shelter. We feed about 50 homeless people every week.

When I started doing this project, I wasn't too sure what to do since I didn't know much about community issues until I was told about this group by the Deacon. Based on my overall experience with the group, I feel like we have done well to help feed or provide other necessities to the homeless. My family and I have also contributed to the group in one way or another, mostly by bringing food to them. Also, from my time knowing the group, they are good people who help provide for the homeless, and I get along well with them. While what we are doing now is good, there can be other ways that the rest of us can contribute to the organization in the future.

One issue that faces the homeless is mental health. Based on what we've experienced when doing our rounds, we have encountered those who are unfortunately not well mentally, and that can be sad. Why it matters to SVdP is that the more the homeless live with mental health problems the less they can survive (or overcome) homelessness.

To show how St. Vincent de Paul would like to seek assistance, I sent out questions to one of the group members, Adrian, mostly based on his experience and work, and asked him what additional help he would like to see in the future. He said, 'I wish the ministry would have the resources or collaboration with other organizations to provide more assistance to those who are experiencing mental health episodes or who do not appear to have the faculties to care for themselves. This requires the attention of trained professionals with access to the appropriate resources to assist those individuals.'

To conclude, I would say that the best call to action, in my opinion, is to help provide for St. Vincent de Paul so that the group can have additional help in order to care for the homeless. It would help if you could either join our group, or help our group provide further assistance. I would suggest contacting our SVdP lead, Marc Anthony Rosario at marc.anthony.rosario@gmail.com if you want to join or assist them. We would appreciate it if you can support our group in any way you can to change somebody's life. Thank you."

SEASON OF STEWARDSHIP: MID-YEAR IMPACT AND FELLOWSHIP REPORT

SUBMITTED BY ST. DOMINIC CONFERENCE



The first half of the 2025-2026 fiscal year centered on a commitment to service and the enduring generosity of the parish community. Through direct outreach and essential financial support, the conference has served as a critical lifeline for neighbors facing housing instability and food insecurity. This period reflects not only a significant investment in local stability but also a deepening of faith and fellowship, as Vincentians continue to meet the community exactly where the need is greatest.

First 6 Months of the 2025-2026 Fiscal Year:

- **A Lifeline for the Community:** The conference responded to 938 phone calls seeking help. Thanks to the generosity of the parish, 885 households received direct assistance.
- **Meeting Neighbors Where They Are:** Vincentians conducted 58 home visits, offering a compassionate presence in the homes of our neighbors.
- **Preventing Homelessness & Hunger:** \$50,004 in rent assistance prevented 53 evictions, while 598 families received \$31,510 in grocery deliveries.
- **Essential Services:** 30 families received \$13,472 for PG&E bills, and 17 families received \$8,078 for water bills.
- **Total Impact:** 2,565 individuals were helped (including 463 children), with year-to-date expenses totaling \$132,842.

Faith & Fellowship:

- **Hawaii Raffle:** Ticket sales have grown to 600 tickets sold this year.
- **Lenten Soup Supper:** In partnership with the Gabriel Project, 130 parishioners gathered for a Lenten Soup Supper and the Stations of the Cross, finding nourishment for both body and soul.
- **Formation:** The conference hosted 30 Vincentians for an Ozanam Orientation in January, deepening their mission of service.

A SEASON OF GROWTH AND GRACE

In the world of building and service, there is a natural rhythm of expansion and contraction. In Shasta County, this cycle has been navigated with faith. Now thanks to dedicated efforts of members from Sacred Heart and St. Anne Parishes, Anderson and Cottonwood have been officially added to the service area. SVdP is now serves nearly all of Shasta County.

While the growth is cause for celebration, decreased capacity elsewhere has led to a temporary reduction in visiting hours. However, this is not seen as a setback, but rather a call to action; with 2026 coined a year of recruitment.

Even amidst growing pains, the the Conference continues to see the face of Christ in every neighbor. Since January the team has completed 129 home visits and distributed \$14,800 in housing assistance and \$18,000 in utility assistance.

Recently after recognizing that many neighbors quietly struggle with travel costs, the conference approved \$2,000 in gas cards. The joy of a neighbor receiving an unexpected \$50 card to get to work or a doctor's appointment is reminder the real difference a small act of grace can make.

The recent 'Share your Love' fundraiser proved that many hands make light work, with parishioners providing a collective wave of support through food and donations. And by sharing our story at local parishes during the Annual Catholic Appeal, we are building greater awareness of our mission

FAITH IN MOTION: BRINGING THE CATHEDRAL TO THE STREETS

The St. James Conference continues to be moved by the creative and compassionate ways the community shows up to support those in need.

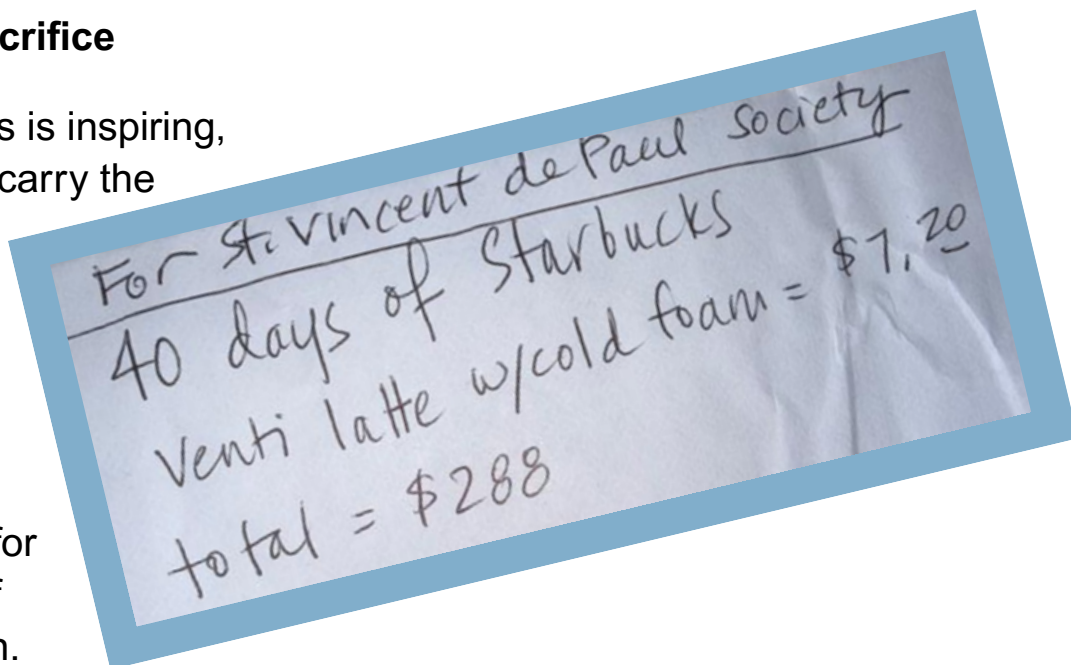
The Momentum of Giving

VOICE FOR THE POOR

CATHOLICS GATHER AT THE CALIFORNIA CAPITOL TO ADVOCATE FOR THE POOR

On March 25, 2026, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul's Voice for the Poor joined the California Catholic Conference for the "Catholics at the Capitol" event in Sacramento to advocate for neighbors experiencing poverty. This powerful day of action featured a rally attended by seven California bishops, a rosary procession and Holy Mass, demonstrating a unified commitment to social justice by putting the virtues of compassion and service into action within our communities. Vincentians from across the state—including a strong showing from the Sacramento Diocesan Council—engaged directly with legislators and staff to discuss policy priorities and share stories of local impact. By bridging the gap between community service and legislative advocacy, participants worked to influence social justice initiatives and amplify the voices of the most vulnerable populations across California.

VOICE FOR THE POOR

WORKING TOGETHER TO END HOMELESSNESS

On March 31, 2026, the Homeless Nonprofit Collective held its fourth meeting to strengthen community support networks. The session featured a mental health presentation by Heartland Child and Family Services and a showcase by local artist Michael Miller, whose work highlights the daily lives of unhoused neighbors (pictured left).



Homelessness remains a pressing issue that impacts everyone within our communities. The stark reality of having no stable place to call home profoundly affects the lives of individuals and families who face this hardship.



This complex crisis requires more than the effort of any single group. While organizations provide essential lifelines—including food, shelter, and basic services—long-term solutions depend on broad collaboration. By partnering with government agencies, healthcare providers, and community groups, individual efforts are transformed into a unified response.



Building on a year of strategic conversations, the group is currently identifying service gaps and challenges to address through collectively. This focused approach aims to produce measurable progress in supporting neighbors and building a more resilient community.

1,100+ CONNECTED: STRENGTHENING SAFETY NETS



True resilience is anchored in ensuring our most vulnerable neighbors are connected to the resources and support systems they need to stay safe. Between January and March 2026, the SVdP Listos team reached 1,101 individuals through disaster preparedness workshops, resources and community-building events.

Since 2024, the Listos team has been forging trust in the communities it serves by meeting people in their own gathering spaces and collaborating with local leaders and trusted messengers. Here is a look at how they are helping to build those safety nets:

During a disaster readiness workshop hosted in collaboration with El Dorado County Office of Emergency Services and Public Health, one woman—new to the 55+ housing community—voiced her fear of not having transportation to evacuate. Her concern was met with immediate action, as neighbors coordinated to ensure she was included in their plans. More than 30 participants signed up for emergency alerts at the event.

Presence matters. Listos team members reached more than 400 individuals and distributed 30 go-bags, 120 hand-crank flashlights, 30 portable chargers and 75 tarps during a two-day outreach at Dandelion Days in Amador County. Perhaps most impactful, however, were the conversations held with locals about their own evacuation experiences and service gaps. One family, who had relocated to the area after being displaced by the Caldor Fire, gained peace of mind by signing up for emergency alerts in their new community and taking home a fully stocked go-bag.

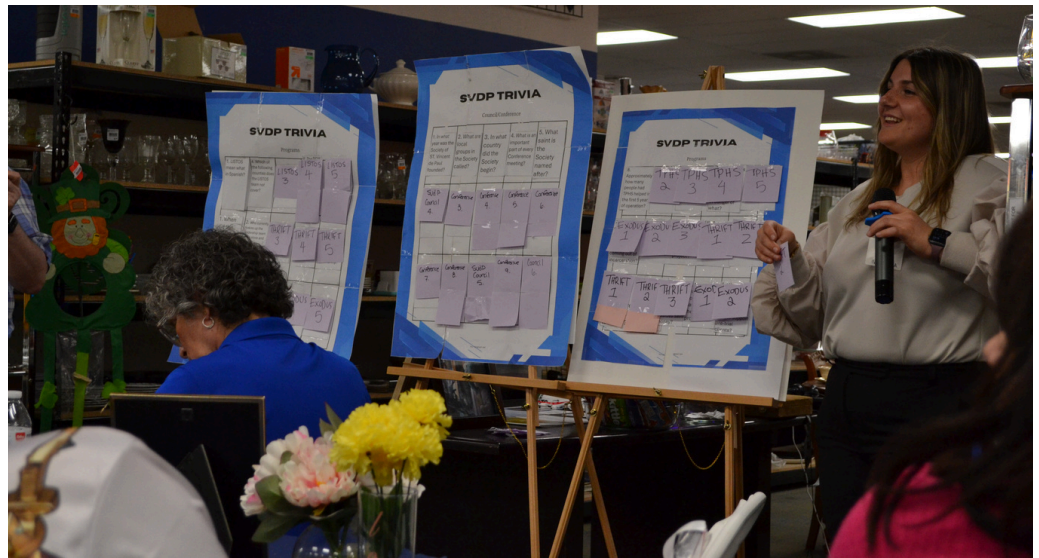
